

Augustana's 20/20 Vision

“So what do people think about Augustana?”

That's the question that the Strategic Planning Team has been working on in the past two months. Through the survey to members in the congregation, and through interviews with community leaders, we're putting some answers together. Here are some of the results so far that I think you'll be interested in:

- There were 155 people (mostly active members) who completed the online or paper survey. Of these respondents, 53% indicated that they thought Augustana was “stronger than we were three years ago.”
- 42% of those answering the survey said they are “more involved than I was three years ago.”
- And, over 80% said they were “satisfied” or “extremely satisfied” with our life together at Augustana.
- The highest rated programs or ministries in the survey were our Sunday worship

services, which is not too surprising.

- Something that is surprising is the number of people who mentioned that they wanted to have more cross-generational activities (programs or ministries that would involve all ages learning, serving, and growing together in faith).

In our interviews with community leaders, we found that many people—aside from our partners at Lutheran Family Services and Metro Caring—knew nothing or next to nothing about Augustana. For instance, our Denver City Councilwoman had never been inside our building, despite living in the neighborhood for 47 years. This gives us all something to think about as we plan for the future: Are there ways that we can serve so we do become known in our local area as a faith community that reaches out with caring and the desire to make a difference?

Now is the time to figure out how we turn these

answers into action.

During the summer, the Strategic Planning Team and Congregation Council will be working together to compile and discuss the data we've received. We will be communicating all along the way with the congregation as possible goals and initiatives are formulated for our ministries.

Thanks to everyone who has participated so far in this important process! Please continue to pray for the Strategic Planning Team (Brian Bernhard, Kari Blanchard, Nancy Johnson, Nick Massie, Dane Vierow, the pastors, and Emmett Cruson (Council President).



There's nothing like a good word

Pastor Caitlin invited people to pick a word from scripture to engage their discipleship and faith for the church year. Each month spotlights a reflection by someone who took her up on a choosing a word.



Enriched

Enriched. It has so many meanings. The Merriam-Webster dictionary has no less than five entries—“to add beauty to,” “to enhance the taste of,” “to make more fertile,” “to improve the nutritive value of by adding nutrients and especially by restoring part of the nutrients lost in processing,” “to process so as to add or increase the proportion of a desirable ingredient.”

Back in December, Pastor Caitlin read a passage of scripture in worship and challenged each person to choose a word from the passage that particularly spoke to them. I usually don't take on such challenges, but this one sounded fun and, in particular, this word “enriched” genuinely jumped out. The sound

of the word is beautiful, almost decadent. I love chocolate, and in particular a dark, rich, chocolate. The sound of “enriched” exudes a feeling of comfort, warmth, and satisfaction; the same feeling after consuming that delicacy.

The application of the word, “enriched” can be applied to my life by answering two questions—“How am I enriched?” and “How do I enrich?” First and foremost, all things begin with God and my faith. He has enriched my life from my first breath with loving parents, a good home, opportunities and experiences (some good, some not so good with lessons to be learned), a wonderful husband and family, and the list continues. He is the

cornerstone of my faith, without which my life would not be enriched. Like the dictionary definition, my faith has added beauty to, and enhanced the taste of life. My faith has made my life more fertile—the nutrients being the study of the Word, especially in the words and music of sacred song. Like that piece of chocolate, my faith comforts, warms, and satisfies. It's enriched. Though for me, it does not end there. My wish is that the blessing of this enrichment be shared. I can only do this in the way that is most natural for me—through my daily living and my music. It is my hope that I enrich the lives of all those who I am around, be it through my mere passing through life, to friendships, or in sharing my love of

music with others on Sunday mornings or in concert. Perhaps, for me, it is summed up best by 2 Corinthians 9:11: “You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.”




Collecting school supplies for clients of Lutheran Family Service

2018 Rocky Mountain Synod Assembly Report

Before we give a synopsis of the 2018 RMSynod Assembly, we want to thank the congregation for the opportunity to represent Augustana Lutheran Church this year, and encourage anyone who is asked to be on the ballot for election as a delegate next year to say ‘yes.’ It was a wonderfully rewarding and uplifting experience. We learned much about the synod, its congregations, and its associated organizations, such as camps and social service agencies. We heard stories of faith in action from invited speakers, participated in truly diverse and inspiring worship services and morning devotions, and met Lutherans from all over our large synod all while helping to carry out important synod business. It was truly an honor and

a pleasure to represent you this year. Thank you!

Opening/morning devotionals

1. **Story of the land** led by Dr. “Tink” Tinker, an Osage Indian scholar who teaches courses in American Indian cultures, history, and religious traditions at Iliff School of Theology. He spoke on the Doctrine of Discovery decreed in 1493 by Pope Alexander VI (and affirmed by the US Supreme Court in 1823) that legitimized the takeover of all land occupied by non-Christian peoples and their enslavement or slaughter. This doctrine was repudiated by the

ELCA at churchwide in 2016. Our synod responded proactively in 2015 by turning over some land to the Four Winds American Indian Council.

2. **Conducted by Shepherd of the Hills and Padres Levavot.** Shepherd of the Hills in Boulder has shared its worship space with Padres Levavot, a Jewish congregation, for 15 years. The Rabbi led us in prayer that had movements which reached from the ground to the sky in praise.
3. **Worship led by the pastors of New Beginnings** congregation at the women’s prison. It showed photos of the women worshipping and included dance, which we were

invited to participate in (as if no one was looking).

Elections

1. **Bishop Gonias was re-elected** overwhelmingly on the first ballot—an ecclesiastical ballot on which members could write the name of any rostered clergy in the ELCA. This had a profound effect on the remaining schedule and mood of the assembly.
2. **Remaining elections** for synod council, 2019 churchwide representatives, and key committees and ministries of the RMSynod

Resolutions:

All passed nearly unanimously

1. **Resolution for the Formation of a**

Rocky Mountain Synod Youth Council: provide for a uniting structure for the youth of the five states making up the synod. This would allow youth participation in event planning. Youth council would initially be made up of one high school youth and one adult from each of the ten RMS conferences and the assistant to the bishop for faith formation.

2. **Resolution for a Synod-wide Dialog concerning Gun Violence:** encourages all congregations within the RMS to engage in a discussion of gun violence and establish policies for their property accordingly.
3. **Resolution on Protecting the Human Rights of Palestinian Children Living under Israeli Military Occupation:** Children 8–18 are often arrested in the middle of the night, held incommunicado, without advice of counsel and tortured until they admit guilt or implicate others.

This resolution was offered in light of the 2005 ELCA initiative—Peace Not Walls, ELCA Social Statement—For Peace in God’s World, ELCA’s relationship with six Palestinian Lutheran congregations in Jordan and the Holy Land, and in support of HR4391 which calls on congress to withhold funding to the Israeli government in areas which they

abrogate human rights. Brad spoke eloquently to this issue. The resolution calls on RMS staff and congregations to advocate for adoption of HR4391.

Other votes

We adopted a few constitutional changes, and we approved the budget for next year.

Keynote speaker

Cynthia Moe-Loveda, professor of theological ethics at Pacific Lutheran

Seminary and Cal Lutheran University, gave four lectures on resisting structural evil, which is when the political system in place benefits one group over another without concern for global environmental or economic consequences. She quoted Luther quite extensively and the Leviticus passage (also affirmed by Jesus) to love thy neighbor as thyself.

Synod assembly ended

with an opportunity for congregations to come forward and share their many projects that grew out of love of neighbor. It was inspiring to learn of the numerous successful ministries by congregations, many of whom may worship only 30–50 on a Sunday.

Finally, all voting delegates were commissioned to be Synod/congregation ambassadors, who will communicate their congregation’s stories to the synod and the synod’s stories to their congregation. The three of us will receive information on different aspects of ministry to share in bulletins and newsletters each month.

A look at Hepatitis C

There are several causes of hepatitis, the most common being viral hepatitis. There are five types of viral hepatitis: A, B, C, D, and E. Hepatitis A, B, and C are the most common.

Hepatitis C, also known as HCV, causes the liver to become inflamed. Inflammation is swelling that occurs when tissues in the body are injured or infected. Hepatitis C can cause an acute or chronic infection of the liver. Acute hepatitis C is a short term infection lasting for up to six months. Sometimes your body can fight off the virus. Studies have shown that approximately 25% of those infected with HCV will be able to rid themselves of the virus without treatment, though scientists do not know how or why. The 75% to 85% of those with acute hepatitis will go on to develop chronic hepatitis C.

Symptoms

Most people who have contracted HCV may not have symptoms for years. However, if you get symptoms it will

most likely feel like the flu. After injury to the liver occurs, the signs will show up as jaundice (which is yellowing of the skin and whites of the eyes), pale colored bowel movements, or dark amber or tea colored urine, pain in abdomen, nausea and vomiting, fatigue or joint pain.

Prevention

Although there is no vaccine for hepatitis C, you can take steps to protect yourself from acquiring the virus.

- Not sharing needles
- Wearing gloves if you touch another person's blood or open wounds
- If getting a tattoo, make sure tools and ink are sterile
- Not sharing personal items such as toothbrushes, razors, or nail clippers
- Practicing safe sex and using a condom

Treatment

If you suspect that you may have been exposed to hepatitis C, see your doctor as soon as possible. Early diagnosis and

treatment can help prevent liver damage.

If you have hepatitis C, talk with your doctor about treatment. There are antiviral medications available. The brand of drug is based on several factors. Your doctor can explain the medications and how long you will need treatment. You should also protect others by not donating blood, tissue or organs. Tell your dentist and other health care providers.
